#### **ORIGINS OF THE SAILING CAPITAL TABLE**

It all began in Portsmouth. VA. I first heard of the Brotherhood while restoring a 30+year old Albin 25 at Mike Montieth's repair yard. I've know Mike for over 20 years and he mentioned the Brotherhood in passing. Several years later (by now 2011) while having an adult beverage with Ramzi Bannura (now our Purser) the subject resurfaced. So I got in touch with Mike and got a more detailed brain dump. The question arose (or perhaps resurfaced) why there was no Table in Annapolis. Why not's have always challenged me.

Mike referred me to Pete Chabot who is a Solomons Founding Brother and a USNA Classmate. We met for breakfast in October 2011 and discussed my taking the lead in standing up a table in Annapolis. I studied the Guide and some other stuff and decided to do it. Pete's basic charge was to have a minimum of eight prospective brothers and take time in assembling the right folks. *The Octalog* was to be my guide. For my part, there were three other important considerations in forming a table:

- Given the number of yacht clubs (EYC, AYC) and organizations (Storm Tri-Sail) in the area no one group should predominate in terms of prospective brothers,
- Geographically if not socially, the area is composed of two totally different and often competing communities... Annapolis being more formal and historically prominent and Eastport layback if not irreverent. The need to capture both without preference to either was important, and lastly
- 3. We wanted to attract younger folks.

Pete became our mentor/sponsor and I started approaching potentially interesting candidates. A huge hand up was the invite from the Solomons Table to join one of their TAF's in the spring of 2012. Mike and several Brothers also travelled from Chesapeake Table for this event. In June I was a guest of the Chesapeake Table for OPSAIL. A core group (between 7 and 9) began to evolve and a name agreed on... Sailing Capital Table.

Pete hosted a TAF for us to meet Charles Hankins and Patrick Mills. We passed muster and shortly after that we got a preliminary go-ahead to form the table. That announcement provided a most heartily felt series of emails from other tables supporting us and wishing us well.

With this sanction in hand, I appointed a Scribe, Purser and Bos'n as a minimum to assist in the mechanics of establishing our table and we got to work. We set up a schedule for monthly TAFs which were mostly organizational designed to ensure we found our way. Pete and John Craighill and Solomons Table Brothers were frequent TAF "guests" and more often than not helped guide us in producing a table logo, flags, pins, and other traditional gear required to standing up a table. The Annapolis Boat Shows saw visits from Mike, Scott Ripley and others from Chesapeake Table. In November we hosted Brothers joining *Statsraad Lehmkuhl* and were in turn feted on board her in Baltimore. Several of us also attended the Savannah Boucan in April. In May we had our first social gathering with our mates that was well attended and successful.

The late spring and early summer of this year had us focused on the induction ceremony. One of the benefits of the planning for this event was the genesis of a table "Culture". Truth told we don't really have one yet. But if the use of an old crusty green bottle from which we dispense rum is any measure.... Well stay tuned!

# D.C. merf Moerschel Salty Dog Founding Brother - 740 Table Captain Mate Betsy



Norwegian ancestry drew him to the sea. merf spent his youth on the Chesapeake. Built his first boat at age 12, crewed in Comets, and taught sailing at a camp. He enlisting in the Navy at 17, won an appointment to Annapolis, graduated in 1960 and served in destroyers. Completion of a self-structured graduate program in maritime affairs led to a commercial maritime career with a series challenges

including off-shore oil rigs, managing a foreign oil port complex, a large container port, and a barge and boat repair facility and financial oversight for medium sized shipyard. Fleet management involved transportation scheduling, contract management and negotiation, chartering, transportation cost analysis, and designing a fleet readiness program. He also bought and turned a 200+ slip marina/yacht club complex. Other activities included: teaching sailing and boating safety, marine surveying, preparing repair estimates, expert witness, and serving on a pilotage authority.

Along the way designed and built several dinghies and a 21 foot sloop and restored five boats including his present craft a 1976 Albin trawler. Cruised the Chesapeake extensively... best part as skipper of a 56' Alden schooner. Coastal and Off-Shore work: East/Gulf Coast from New England to Texas, the ICW to Florida a number of times, parts of the West Coast including San Juan Islands (Pearson 38), Trinidad, BVIs (43' Cat and 50' Beneteau), and North Sea. Completed roundtrip voyages to Bahamas and New England (Morgan 366). He is past-member in various maritime associations/professional groups (SNAME, ASME) and Naval Academy Sailing Squadron, and member of Eastport Yacht Club and Fleet Reserve Association.

With two friends, to chip in for gas, I was always on the water, fishing, waterskiing or just tooling around. I learned to sail about 1970 starting in a sunfish and eventually working up to a 40' cruising boat. My idea of heaven is having a small cruising sailboat, for when there's wind and a small powerboat for when there's not.

In 1998 my wife agreed to retire, get rid of everything (cars, house, furniture, etc.), live on a boat, follow the sun and see the world. ## Bob Howe Old Salt Posthumous Founding Brother - 746 Mate Wendy Kravit



Bob Howe was greatly looking forward to joining the Brotherhood of the Coast as a founding member of the Sailing Capital Table. He became an avid sailor after learning to sail on Lake Pontchartrain while attending Tulane University in New Orleans as an army officer. While assigned to the Pentagon he became a founding member of the Pentagon Sailing Club. Later he became a volunteer with the Navy Sailing Program. Following retiring from the

Army, spent many volunteer hours as a sailing coach for the Naval Academy and eventually as executive director of the Navy Sailing Program. He loved to tell stories of how this retired army officer was teaching navy personnel how to sail.

His Pearson 39 sported a sticker on the binnacle that said "Army Sailing". He sailed in almost every North American race as an Academy sailing coach, numerous sails to Bermuda (he did at least 9 round trips to Bermuda one summer), the Caribbean 1500 and the Mackinaw race on Lake Michigan. He was known for never allowing yelling on his boat and instituting the concept of the "blame watch". Sailing was meant to be fun.

Bob epitomized the Brotherhood. He was an early recruit to the Sailing Capital Table and was to be the Table Scribe. He became involved quickly: the Baltimore port call of *Statsraad Lehmkuhl*, with Wendy attended the Savannah Boucan, and had planned to attend the World Zafarrancho France 2014. Bob succumbed to a sudden and acute lung disease and passed away on July 1, 2013. He is sorely missed.
