

Anyhow, we made the trip in late May at a time when the southeastern U.S. was sodden with heavy rains. This made for an especially soggy trip, especially given the need for frequent ashore trips for the senior cruise director Texas, our well known BOC party-animal toy poodle.

The summer use of the boat turned out to be a bit of a bust, as we discovered the drive from Greenville to Charleston was, at 235 miles, a little more than we wanted to do regularly. While Charleston is a beautiful and fun southern city... it also makes the summer climate of Houston look positively balmy! Hot, Humid, and a bunch less than comfortable. Net result was fewer trips than we had anticipated, but fun nonetheless.

In advance of the trip back to the Keys I followed the advice of the locals, and hired a diver to clean the bottom and running gear. Charleston harbor suffers a nearly 8 foot tide range, very warm water, and massive marine growth on hulls. The locals claimed to use divers every month! Given our arrival in early June to departure on November 1<sup>st</sup>, we had a pretty good crop! In fact, we ended up having a second diver clean the props in Beaufort, SC located about 50 miles south. Planing hull power boats can get serious vibrations with barnacle growth on the props.

Having made the transition from sail to 25 knot power, I recognize that perhaps many of my Brothers see this 700 nautical mile trip very differently. Where we used to consider a 50 mile day from one anchorage to the next a very full effort, we now travel 125 to even 150 miles, and arrive at a marina in time for a spot of rum and a nice dinner ashore. Having lived in Texas for 18 years, we understand the importance of burning all the fossil fuel possible for a robust economy!;-))

The trip was completed in 6 days with a combination of offshore work and Intracoastal cruising. We have previously enjoyed taking a more leisurely trip, but were anxious to return home to Marathon. If ever you get the chance to transit the southeastern states, be advised it is a fun and beautiful trip, with many friendly and welcoming southern towns along the way.

Oh! And the Super Bowl was fun too.





A few Brothers will be attending a memorial for Hal Bailey/"Brumby" April 3 in Baltimore.


